ears ago I remember standing at the bottom of the Empire State Building in New York City. I became dizzy trying to look up to the top of it. It and structures like it are simply amazing feats of design and construction.

Imagine if I had inquired with its management as to who the designer and builder was and that they responded to me with all seriousness and sincerity that there weren't any, that it has just evolved there over millions and millions of years, and through many iterational stages of existence – presto – the Empire State Building now appears in its present form as a result of the evolutionary process.

My sons sell and repair laptop computers. These machines are amazing. Frankly I do not know what I would do without mine. When someone inquired of one of my sons as to who made a laptop they were interested in purchasing, suppose they responded that there was no manufacturer; that it had just evolved in the repair shop.

When I was a teenager I worked for a summer as a stripper. Now before we go too far here, you should know that I was stripping the paint from airplanes so that they could be repainted. Suppose I asked who had made the particular airplane on which I was working and the answer was, "no one," that it had just evolved.

The daily newspaper is delivered to my home each morning before it is yet light outside. Suppose I

wanted to contact the publisher, just to have the paper-carrier tell me that there was none, and that the paper just evolved each morning, and he simply just delivered it.

That after eons of evolution the newspaper now appears with columns filled with words, sentences, paragraphs and articles, with the

current date – all typeset and making sense, that told stories of current events – is irrational beyond seriousness!

All of these are absolutely absurd propositions – totally beyond reason. A man would be a fool to suggest any of these; a man would be a fool to accept them.

The very idea that such a complex machine as an aircraft does not have a designer and manufacturer – no one in their right mind would entertain such silliness!

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## **My Labors**

Empire State Building, a laptop computer, an airplane, and the newspaper. Take our human body for example: it far exceeds the grandeur and complexity of any of these things. If these other things demand a designer and maker, we demand one even more. Look all around us. Everywhere is evidence which demands a Creator: flowers, birds, rainbows, sun, moon, stars – just to name a few.

It is impossible to have a building without a builder. It is impossible to have a creation without a Creator.

Paul taught that believers with opposite understandings and practices (even if one may be *weak* in the faith) could both live their lives in honor to the Lord. # Morning and Evening

Vanity of vanities; all is vanity ... I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and, behold, all is vanity ... (Ecclesiastes 1:2, 14).

 ife is vain when viewed apart from the Sovereign, loving God Who is our Father.

I feel for those who face daily life apart from the knowledge that He is in complete control.

My days, all of them were written in Your book; the days, they were formed when there was not one of them (Psalms 139:16).

The steps of a man are ordered by the LORD (Psalms 37:23).

Think of these wonderful truths. All of your days were written in God's book, formed there before any of them ever had been lived. Many live their daily lives without recognition of the stabilizing truth of the One Who "works all things after the counsel of His Own will" (Ephesians 1:11). They approach their day, and struggle through it, as the master of their own lives.

For those who live as though they were in charge of their lives, two of the hardest parts of the day are waking up in the morning and going to bed in the evening.

In the mornings, days are greeted with uncertainty as thoughts of the "What if ..." trials and challenges of the day press in upon the mind and heart. There is a waking up to varying degrees of uneasiness, concern, apprehension, worry and anxiety; even at times to overwhelming fear, dread and depression. Feelings of inadequacy and uncertainty press in.

In the evenings, days are retired with the annoying "What if ..." reflections of its happenings. There is second guessing, regret and disappointment. Feelings of frustration, dissatisfaction and failure settle in; even at times shame, guilt and worthlessness. After all, they see themselves as the lords of their own lives, the captains of their own ships and the masters of their own destiny. With this view comes but a recurring cycle of vanity.

Vanity of vanities; all is vanity ... What profit has a man of all his labor which he takes under the sun? One generation passes away, and another generation comes: but the earth abides. The sun also arises, and the sun goes down, and hastens to his place where he arose ... All things are full of labor; man cannot express it: the eye is not satisfied with seeing, nor the ear filled with hearing (Ecclesiastes 1:2-8).

Why is man's life filled with such vanity; such futility, emptiness, barrenness, purposelessness and aimless frustration? Because he has been subjected so by his Creator.

For the creature was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of Him Who has subjected the same in hope (Romans 8:20).

"Vanity" is the lot of man "under the sun." Yet for the believer who has been seated in the celestials, quite another view prevails! Instead of being bound to vanity, we can rise to heights of divine life.

Solomon's perspective, "under the sun," showed the vanity of the human viewpoint. Paul's perspective, "far above all heavens," revealed true purpose found only in the divine viewpoint: "your labor is **NOT IN VAIN** in the Lord" (I Corinthians 15:58).

Those of us who know Father as the great Planner and Director of our days have a completely different approach to our mornings and evenings – and the entire unfolding of every minute of our day. It will be found that, throughout their lives, they were no more masters of their fate than they were of the date and details of their birth. – A.E. Knoch

In the mornings, days can be greeted with the joy and excitement of knowing that *they* are His, as well as ourselves. The uncertainties of the "What if …" viewpoint are divinely transformed into the eager anticipation of seeing what God has planned for the day. We are able to awaken to the thrill of knowing that we will be witnesses of the unfolding of His detailed plan and purpose for our day. His presence presses in upon our minds. There is a waking up to peace and joy as we know that our life, with all of its daily circumstances, is firmly in His hand, and carried out by His capable direction. Our hearts are able to say, "Today we are on the great adventure of faith!"

In the evenings, when the day is over, we can rest our heads on our pillows and with surety and confidence regarding our day say, "This was the will of God." The "What if ..." reflections of its happenings are transformed into a place of peace and rest – knowing that the will of God was done, and who could have prevented it? The realization of our divine appointment is able to settle within our hearts and minds. After all, *He* is the Lord of our life, the Captain of our ship, the Master of our destiny.

We have the rest of laying our heads on our pillow each night as His *achievement*.

... a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief (Isaiah 53:3).

saiah foretold of Israel's coming Messiah. His description of Him in chapter 53 was that He was, among other things, "... a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief."

Our Lord Jesus Christ was acquainted with what it meant to be human – to suffer sorrows and grief. When He was here in the flesh, although King and Master of Israel, He did not live as such. Rather, He lived and conducted Himself as a humble servant.

But made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant ... (Philippians 2:7).

As humanity's Servant, He experienced the same cares and sufferings of life as did those to whom He ministered. He *identified* with them in that He endured the full range of human sorrows and suffering. For, ... Surely He has borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows ... (Isaiah 53:4).

What identity with broken humanity! He bore our griefs, He carried our sorrow. Truly, He was,

... Touched with the feelings of our infirmities (Hebrews 4:15).

The word translated "infirmities" here is the Greek word astheneia, which James Strong defines as "feebleness" ("un-firmness" – Concordant Keyword Concordance). He was immersed into our weakness and brokenness, so that His poverty might be our enrichment,

For we know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that you through His poverty might be made rich (II Corinthians 8:9).

He who has ears to hear, let him hear (Matthew 11:15).

... Not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God (John 1:13).

Therefore has He mercy on whom He will have mercy, and whom He will He hardens (Romans 9:18).

Has not the potter power over the clay, of the same lump to make one vessel unto honor, and another unto dishonor? (Romans 9:21).

But God has chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God has chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty, and base things of the world, and things which are despised, has God chosen, yes, and things which are not, to bring to nothing things that are (I Corinthians 1:27-28). So then it is not of him who wills, nor of him who runs, but of God Who shows mercy (Romans 9:16).

Christendom is just another world-religion. We have been called out of the religious system; and those of us who have been charged with teaching, like Timothy, are called to "herald the Word" in search of "faithful men" who have the "ears to hear" their calling as outsiders (the ecclesia – God's called-out-ones).

Our call is not for a re-awakening of some manmade "church." Rather, the call is to individuals – those whose place in the "Christian" religious system has left them empty, stagnant and restless. It is an awakening to Father's call to faithfully stand with Him outside of that system.

It is my prayer and desire that these efforts to herald Paul's evangel will be used by Father to find fruit in those whom He is calling out, and that they will be used by Him to help them on their journey.

## Freedom from Identifying and Assigning Motives

With me it is a very small thing that I should be judged of you, or of man's judgment: yea, I judge not my own self (I Corinthians 4:3).

Then we seek to identify motives in others, what we actually may be doing is "evil surmising" or "wicked suspicions" (I Timothy 6:4). That's why we can't start with, or count on the heart as being the FOCUS in our relationships together "in Christ." We must come back to Christ as our FOCUS. If we FOCUS on Christ, He can be counted on for producing grace and edification. Our attempts to identify our hearts, our motives are unsure; but Christ is sure!

Suppose we had *that* as our FOCUS, instead of our own hearts and motives! What might be the results of our relationships in Christ?

Well has C.S. Lewis written:

Humans are very seldom either totally sincere or totally hypocritical. Their moods change, their motives are mixed, and they are often themselves quite mistaken as to what their motives are.

To that we say, Amen! How liberating to be freed from the bondage of our own hearts! Even our apostle would not judge himself – he left it with the Lord, Who alone knows the answer to these things!

We have been *freed* to know Christ – something sure! – and to have our motives in *Him*. We have many precious things together in Christ – things that we can richly enjoy together if we keep our eyes on *Him*! So, if I *really* want to get to know the *REAL* you better, I simply need to get to know Christ better; if you *really* want to get to know the *real* me better, you need to get to know Christ better; and if I want to get to know the *real* "me," I need to open my Bible and get to know *HIM*!

If we approach our relationships in any other way than "in Christ," we will approach them from a carnal viewpoint. If we seek to know one another in Adam, we WILL find carnality – but this is NOT who we really are. So, if we seek for folks merely to reveal their "hearts" – and they oblige us – we will risk becoming continually disillusioned. However, if we choose to live with our brothers and sisters the same way that God does – which is "in Christ" – the conflict will cease. At least it will cease in our own hearts – the real us – which is Christ. Then, even if our brothers or sisters are not enjoying the fullness of their *TRUE* person, *we* can love them as who they *really* are, in spite of how they are "acting!"

Anything less than this will be to no avail. We will simply be using our human reasoning to lay forth the conditions by which we will have supposed "spiritual" relationships – conditions by which we will accept one another – and we will use these human, carnal standards to judge one another.
