## The Consummation

We read in Luke 1:33,

He shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end (KJV).

Then we read in I Corinthians 15:24-25,

Then cometh the end, when He shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father; when He shall have put down all rule and all authority and power. For He must reign, till He hath put all enemies under His feet (KJV).

Is this a discrepancy in God's Word? On the one hand we read that He (Christ) will reign forever and ever, but on the other hand we see His reign coming to an end as He delivers up the kingdom to God. True, the kingdom continues without end, but Christ no longer reigns. Which is it then? Does Christ reign forever and ever, or does he only reign "until"?

A comparison of these two passages shows us very clearly that the Greek *ai*ons cannot possibly mean "*forever*" ... it is a finite time period. The *Concordant Literal Translation* for Luke 1:33 reads,

He shall reign over the house of Jacob for the eons.

Now we see that the two passages are quite consistent; there is no discrepancy at all. Christ reigns for the *eons* (not endlessly, but for a period of time) – "until" He has accomplished what He set out to do. Once all enemies are under His feet, His reign comes to an end as He delivers up the kingdom to God.

#### PROPERLY HANDLING THE WORD OF GOD

We are not to read the Word of God haphazardly; we are to study it, "correctly cutting" or "correctly dividing" the word of truth (II Timothy 2:15).

Translators should take great care to deliver a faithful, consistent rendering of the original languages, so as to eliminate what may come across as discrepancies simply because the translation is faulty. When we study, we must closely examine how all parts of God's Word fit together.

Many assume that the book of Revelation is the final word on God's revelation. They forget that to Paul were revealed things that had been secrets in past ages (Ephesians 3:3-5) and that to Paul it had been granted to "complete" the Word of God (Colossians 1:25).

Paul revealed things to come that could not be revealed until the Jews finally rejected the kingdom (Acts 28:23-28) and it became time for the complement of the nations to be entering (Romans 11:25ff).

#### "THE CONSUMMATION" OF I CORINTHIANS 15 COMES AFTER REVELATION 22

As Revelation comes to an end, we see the end of the ages; but as the last "Amen" of Revelation 22 is uttered, there is more to come. The crowning event of the ages is found in I Corinthians 15, the "consummation" of the ages.

Many believe the end of Revelation is a description of the eternal heavens that we will experience when the resurrection takes place, but there are a number of reasons to conclude that this is not the case, and that I Corinthians 15 happens after the end of Revelation 22.

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In Revelation 21:1 John perceives "a new heaven and a new earth," and he sees "the holy city, new Jerusalem,

descending out of heaven ..." The New Jerusalem is not heaven itself, but it descends out of heaven.

# God Has Prepared Some Better Thing for Us

The Hope of Philippians 3 Is Better than that of I Thessalonians 4

#### TODAY, IF YE WILL HEAR HIS VOICE<sup>1</sup>

It was a solemn moment for Israel at Kadesh-Barnea; ever to be remembered. Moses had told the people how God had said.

Go up and possess the land which I have given you, but ye rebelled against the commandment of the Lord, and ye believed Him not, nor hearkened to His voice (Deuteronomy 9:13).

They heard His voice that day. He said,

Go up. Enter into My rest. Yet, in this thing ye did not believe the Lord your God (Deuteronomy 1:32).

As those words of Psalm 95 (called the *Venite*) are sung week by week (generally as rapidly as the words can be got out of the mouth), how few stop to think of the solemnity of their meaning!

Forty years long was I grieved with that generation! (:10).

Yes! Forty years of wandering. Why? Because they believed the evil report of ten men, instead of two who witnessed to the truth of God's good report which *He had already given of that land*.

True, they did enter at last. After long years of wandering they crossed the Jordan on the east when they might have entered by the hill-country of the Amorites from the south 37½ years before!

When Peter made the proclamation in Acts 3:19-21 and called on the nation Israel to "Repent," and gave God's promise that He would send Jesus Christ, and times of refreshing should come from the presence of the Lord; the people were at another Kadesh-Barnea!

Israel was, again, face-to-face with another command and promise of the Lord. A way was open over (as it were) "the hill-country of the Amorites" (Deuteronomy 1:44). This was the *Parousia*, or Coming of the Lord, made known to faith in the first and earliest of all of the epistles of Paul, and made known by a special revelation in I Thessalonians 4:13-5:11.

This was something better than "the hill country of the Amorites," and it was far, far better than crossing by Jordan – for, this would have been a going up indeed! It was entering the heavenly Canaan without going through Jordan, "the grave and gate of death" to resurrection. This was a hope for those who were alive and remained.

That is why the Apostle could say: "WE, which are alive and remain": for, how was he to know but that the nation would Repent; and that he would really be among those who were alive, and would go up over the hill-country, yea, in the clouds of heaven, without dying, or crossing Jordan?

As I Thessalonians 4 was the Kadesh-Barnea of believers in that day, and Israel as a people did not thus "go up," so is Philippians 3:10, 14, 20-21 our Kadesh-Barnea today, if we will hear His voice.

Thousands refuse to believe His voice. They agree in affirming that the only way of entering Canaan is by crossing the Jordan, the river of death. Some few of them go on to believe that it is by death *and resurrection*. Yet how few believe that *God has prepared some better thing for us*.

In writing to the believers in Thessalonica in A.D. 52, while Peter's offer of the kingdom, made in Acts 3:19-21, was still before the nation, and before its formal withdrawal in Acts 28:23-28, nothing could be added to the revelation then made in I Thessalonians 4.

However, *after* that withdrawal of the offer from Israel, and the sending of the Salvation of God to the Gentiles, the question is: Was any further revelation to be made? Had God exhausted the riches of His grace and of His glory? Had He nothing more to make known to His children?

In the case of I Thessalonians 4, had not certain events to take place before any fresh revelation of truth would be made known? Had not the formal withdrawal of Peter's offer to take place; and then, would not the way be open for further revelations to be made?

We find that, when the Apostle was in prison in Rome, revelations were given to him; secrets hidden from men for generations, and "hid in God," were made known.

In that Roman prison precious secrets were revealed for the Apostle's and for our own comfort and faith and hope. Shall we be like Israel at Kadesh-Barnea? Shall we believe God speaking through Paul, as He spoke through Caleb and Joshua? Or, shall we believe the majority, as Israel believed the majority of the spies?

Shall we say that, when Paul wrote I Thessalonians 4, God had nothing fresh to reveal, in the face of the fact that, up to that time, we have not a breath of *the mystery?* Not a word as to the revelation and teaching given to us in Ephesians?

Did Paul himself know anything about it until he was inspired to inscribe it in his book and his parchments (II Timothy 4:13)?

Does not this tell us that the objects of our faith are *WRITTEN DOWN* in the Scriptures of truth, and not *handed down* by the traditions of men?

Did the epistle to the Ephesians contain all that God had to reveal?

Is there nothing new in Philippians?

What is the *resurrection* and *translation* in Philippians 3:10 at which the Apostle so desired to arrive?

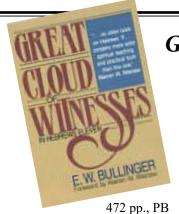
What is the "prize" of the "calling on high" (:14). The A.V. and R.V. have obscured this by translating it "high" as though it were an adjective; whereas it is an adverb, and should be rendered upward (as R.V. margin) or on high. Was not the Apostle's goal conformity to Christ in Glory?

Is this the same as I Thessalonians 4, or is it something additional? The whole context shows that the Apostle was reaching forth to something set before him, and forgetting the things behind him. He did not reckon that he had laid hold of it; but he pressed toward the goal. He had not already reached it, but he was following on so that he might lay hold of that, for which he was himself laid hold of by Christ Jesus.

If we read carefully Philippians 3:10-15, may we gather that we have some fresh revelation of Glory hinted at? Is it because we have been trying to identify it with I Thessalonians 4 that Philippians 3 has always been more or less of a difficulty with all of us?

If, "Faith cometh by hearing," then what God has spoken, let us "today hear His voice," that we may enter into His rest.
