#### How the Bible Translates Itself

To learn something from God Himself regarding Bible translations, we only need to read the Bible itself. The standard of translation has been clearly demonstrated to us by Him. Over and over again the New Testament quotes the Old Testament. To manage this, the Hebrew words of the Old Testament are *translated* into the Greek words of the New Testament. Because of the inspiration of the New Testament books, this translation process is all a Divine activity.

We will now see some example of this translation work of God. What we will notice in these passages is variations of the Greek translation from the Hebrew text. These divinely generated translations are not word-for-word matches. At times the passage will be quoted more than once, with *each* of the occurrences slightly different. All have the same identical meaning, all being the Word of God.

This section below is not intended to be a quick-read. We are providing this for a serious, thoughtful consideration of the very nature of translation work, especially as it relates to the Word of God. Remember that these original texts and their various translations are *all* the work of God, and thus *all* the word of God.

All verses are taken from the King James Version.

For I will be merciful to their unrighteousness, and their sins and their iniquities will I remember no more. (Hebrews 8:8-12)

Have ye offered unto me sacrifices and offerings in the wilderness forty years, O house of Israel? (Amos 5:25)

O ye house of Israel, have ye offered to me slain beasts and sacrifices by the space of forty years in the wilderness? (Acts 7:42)

But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel (Micah 5:2)

And thou Bethlehem, in the land of Juda, art not the least among the princes of Juda: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel (Matthew 2:6)

What we learn from these divine examples of translation is that the exact words used, or even the order of the words in sentence structure are not what is ultimately at issue with God. What is at issue with Him is the clear conveyance of meaning. Obviously, when it comes to translation, He places some value in variety.

As His sons, why should we have any different approach to translation work? Why should we not embrace variety? Why should this not be the standard of the care of our Father's words – words that have been committed to our trust; words for which we are responsible to generation?

As we have already learned before, even the King James Version translators themselves (some today believing that they were operating under divine guidance) where inclined toward variety. This is clearly demonstrated by the abundance of their variant readings in the margins. It was they themselves that provided for us alternate translations of their own version of the Bible; but, after all, variations in translations is a divine principle.


