Christ "Captures Captivity"

Ascending on high, He captures captivity (Ephesians 4:8, Concordant).

OUR CURRENT SUBJECTION TO BONDAGE IS SUBJECTED TO HOPE

All that binds creation in shackles will find its demise in Christ: sin, failure, vanity, emptiness, unfulfillment, uselessness, the law, alienation, againstness, condemnation, unbelief, obstinacy, rebellion, stubbornness, humiliation, corruption, decay and death - to name a few.

By the complete success of Christ, He "captures captivity." He takes prisoner all that has locked us up in slavery, and it is all as good as done! Divine revelation calls "what is not [yet] as if it were" (Romans 4:17, Concordant).

All that binds us is summed up in the word "captivity," and our Lord Jesus Christ captured it. He took all that captures us and made it captive. Christ has

already conquered all of our enemies, including the last one - death. Having fully captured all that holds us captive, He has insured our release. According to the passage, He did not do this while He was dead, but after His resurrection, when He ascended up "on high."2

Ascending on high, He captures captivity.

OUR DELIVERANCE IS IN CHRIST

Concerning this deliverance from captivity found in Ephesians 4:8, John H. Essex (1907-1991) writes,3

Paul well knew what captivity meant. At the time he wrote these lines, he was incarcerated in Rome. He was aware also of a perpetual battle within himself, a struggle between flesh and spirit, in which the flesh would always have the tendency to lead him into captivity to the law of sin which ▶

was in his members (Romans 7:23). Likewise, he was well versed in the Mosaic law, which had the effect of captivating all who were under it. To say that Christ "captures captivity" is another way of saying, "For freedom Christ frees us" (Galatians 5:1). Elsewhere Paul speaks of "the deliverance which is in Christ Jesus" (Romans 3:24).4

VICTORY'S TRIUMPH!

In Ephesians 4:8 Paul cites Psalm 685 which is a reference to victory's triumph over the enemy. Here again are Essex's comments:

Paul was well acquainted with the Sacred Scriptures and, quite often guided by God's spirit, quotes passages from the Hebrew writings ("Old Testament"), applying them to the presentation of the evangel he was commissioned to dispense. Here he quotes from Psalm 68, which is a song of triumph.

TOTAL FREEDOM

The work of Christ has secured for all creation⁶ deliverance from every bondage which has enslaved it.

If the Son therefore shall make you free, ye shall be free indeed (John 8:36).

GLORIOUS FREEDOM!

Every limitation, every oppression, every burden, every inadequacy, every encumbrance, every affliction, every insufficiency, every shortfall, every handicap will be permanently removed, for,

The creation itself, also, shall be freed from the slavery of corruption into the glorious freedom of the children of God (Romans 8:21, Concordant).

Concerning this glorious freedom it has been writ-

The creation itself shall, in a glorious sense, be delivered into that freedom from debility and decay in which the children of God, when raised up in glory, shall expatiate; into this freedom from corruptibility the creation itself shall, in a glorious sense, be delivered.7

The creation has been involved in the treadmill of corruption through the sin of man. We are associated with the creation on the physical side. When our bodies are delivered from their present slavery and death at our Lord's descent from heaven, He will transfigure them to conform them to His body glorious (Philippians 3:21). Later, when we are unveiled, the creation will be set at liberty from the bondage which now enthralls it. How it ought to comfort us to know that the patient, suffering creatures,8 who had no hand in their own degradation, will yet find a real release from the pain and sorrow from which they have no escape now! Its physical aspect waits until our Lord's return.9

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The Wonderful Book

he Bible is a wonderful book, and a book of wonders. First of all, it is wonderful in that we have it at all, and then it is even more wonderful in that we have it in so perfect a state considering the experiences through which it has passed.

Men have tried to exterminate it. It has been outlawed, burned by fire, hacked by criticism; men have hated it and hunted it, but in spite of all of this it is with us today bearing its witness to the God Whose book it is.

The antagonism of its enemies and the indifference of its friends; the implacable hatred of the church of Rome and the but lukewarm interest of the Protestant sects have alike failed to accomplish the Satanic design that the Book of books – this wonderful Book – should be forgotten by the human race.

As well might the arch-enemy have tried to blot the stars from the vaults of heaven – those stars whose courses are appointed by God – as quench the light that gleams upon the page of Holy Writ. Not once, not twice, but many a thousand times has human authority in one of its various forms (religious authority, philosophical authority, etc.) sealed the tomb in which it supposed it had laid the lifeless corpse of the Book, but scarcely had they interred it to their own satisfaction than their seals were broken.

We speak of wonderful poems, such as those of Shakespeare or Milton, but these writings were wonderful because their *writers* were wonderful. But the Bible is a wonderful book, not because of its writers *but in spite of them*! These writers were but as pens in the hand of God, and bad pens, too, we might think some of them to be; but God wrote His wonderful Book in spite of the badness of the pens He had to write it with!

Some of these human pens, because of the qualifications they might be deemed to have, might be likened to fine, delicate-pointed pens; but others that God used in His inscribing were as stub-points compared to these. Notwithstanding, stub-points and fine were alike used to write the some message. The Master-Workman never quarreled with His tools.

We must pause a moment to note the *growing* wonder of the Book. Its wonder defied the bitterness of its enemies, the apathy of its friends, and could not be dimmed or lessened by reason even of those who were used to compile it!

Its writers (for it had many writers, but only one Author) were drawn from every rank and station in life: the palace and the herdsmen's hut; the Egyptians courts and the fisherman's boat, and yet through the writings of all flows the same, unsullied ever-broad(see Book, page 5413)

Studies in Ecclesiastes: The Words and Works of God and Man

Many current versions of the Bible often translate the same Hebrew word in various ways. In this way a veil of mystery has been thrown over many a passage, and a certain amount of human opinion and guesswork has been imported into God's truth. The Book of Ecclesiastes has severely suffered from inconsistency in translation – no sacred book has ever been so much misunderstood in its whole aim and spirit. Our aim should always be to adjust our thoughts to the facts, and never to adjust the facts to our thoughts.

Applying this principle to the matter in hand, our prime concern is to ascertain what the book of Ecclesiastes has to say about itself. The book aims at achieving a threefold object: (1) Recognition of God as God; (2) Reception of His revelation; (3) Regulation of life in view of a future rectification or judgment.

Facsimile Project

I am certainly thrilled to report the launching of a new publishing endeavor: the Facsimile Project. We have now begun an extensive re-printing of out-ofprint materials.

Since the inception of *Bible Student's Press*¹ we have focused our attention on printing new books (from author's such as myself) as well as re-typesetting valuable books from other authors of the past (such as E.W. Bullinger.)

This new venture is the facsimile printing of older works. The publishing of exact copies, while at times not as clear a printing result as a re-typeset, affords us some relief from the arduous task of producing an entirely new layout. The obvious benefit is that we will be able to greatly expand our publishing ministry.

We had initially produced two such reproduction works, but we had a number of snags necessitating collaboration to truly get this project underway. In April my editor and friend Andre Sneidar came to the *Pilkington Abbey* for a few days. Among the many publishing projects that were addressed was our Facsimile Project. He and my son Nathan were able to re-

ening stream of wonder!

The Bible does not merely *contain* poetry. It is poetry. When we consider that in its entirety (as shown in such works as the *Companion Bible*¹) it is dominated by a series of structural parallelisms, introversions, etc., we cannot help concluding that it is constituted by such literary architecture as *one huge poem!*

The balanced rhythm of its form hints at the harmony which underlies all of the apparent discords and discrepancies that may seem to lie upon the surface.

The Bible not only has had a wonderful history, but it is a wonderful history. Human productions are mysteries rather than histories, for they describe the fog of human life and happenings but they do not pierce or dispel it. Not seeing the "reason" back of events they can give no reason for them. Such histories merely seek to put the problems upon the blackboard – without the answer.

Human histories have been likened to showers of rain, so many downfalls of unrelated drops, with no real connection between the different writers. Such records are like a quantity of beads separated and unstrung. How different is the history recorded in the wonderful Book! Here events are strung as beads upon the golden purpose of God.

Biblical history is wonderful, not only because of what

it contains but because of what it leaves out. It makes much of Moses and little of Egypt. It gives prominence to Daniel and none to Babylon. It notes Paul the prisoner in a Roman cell and ignores the pomp and glory of imperial Rome. Why? Because it is a history of the things that "mattered." Moses mattered – Egypt did not. Daniel mattered –Babylon not. Paul mattered – not so Rome. Paul and his fellow-saints were more wonderful than all of the Caesars of Rome.

The Bible is also wonderful because of its prophecies. Prophecy has been called "history written in advance." It lisps no stammering "perhaps" of events to take place next year, but with the stately majesty of Omniscience² sounding in every syllable it utters events far beyond the life-bounds of a generation. Prophecy is the Voice of the God Who *knows* all; and He knows all because He *does* all.

Yet Paul's prophecy looks to a time still more wonderful, for the Philippian prophecy deals with a moment when the whole of creation wonders and worships the One Whose name is Wonderful. His presence it is that will make heaven and earth a wonderful place. It is just that which makes the Bible a wonderful book.
