The Effect of Faith

on Unbelieving Spouses and Children

The unbelieving husband is hallowed by the wife, and the unbelieving wife is hallowed by the brother, else, consequently, your children are unclean. Yet now they are holy (I Corinthians 7:14).

I often think about the effect of faith on those around us. While I used to be critical of what I referred to as "secondhand faith," I do see the value that others can obtain by being around those who have been granted faith by God.

For not one of us is living to himself, and not one is dying to himself (Romans 14:7, CV).

Faith has a divine influence, not only on its recipient, but also on those whose lives interact with them. The effect of faith can leave its mark on the unbelieving as well.

Paul clearly teaches that one such profound effect of faith is on the spouses and children of believers.

The unbelieving husband is **hallowed** by the wife, and the unbelieving wife is **hallowed** by the brother, else, consequently, your children are unclean. Yet now they are **holy** (I Corinthians 7:14).

According to Paul, unbelieving spouses and children become associated with an important part of their election: they are declared "sanctified" and "holy." Such is said by Scripture to be the divine impact of faith on them.

We will make note of two Greek words used by

Paul in I Corinthians 7:14. The first is ἁγιάζω (hagiazō),¹ and the other is its root word ἅ-γιος (hagios).² Hagiazō appears twice in the verse, both times rendered as "sanctified" in the KJV and YLT – and "hallowed" in CV, RE and DT. Hagios is found once, translated "holy."

Under Israel's prior economy, various things, places, and grounds were said to be "sanctified," or "hallowed," and thus "holy." Interestingly, in relationship to people we see hagios translated "saints." Accordingly, a consistent, concordant translation would render the last phrase of the verse as,

Yet now they are saints.

This is quite profound language coming from the pen of Paul, for he is also plain in his declaration that there is surely an allotment to be enjoyed "among all

who have been hallowed [hagiazo]" (Acts 20:32). If words mean anything, especially those of the original language, then unbelieving spouses and children are among the "all" who will be enjoying future allotments, right alongside their believing counterparts. Such is the powerful effect of faith upon these closest of human relationships.

It's important for us to proclaim *exactly* what the Scriptures declare. Equally true, we must not assert what they do not affirm. While unbelieving spouses are hagiazō ("hallowed"), and thus hagios ("saints"), they are nonetheless not presently said to be "believers," members of the "ecclesia which is His Body," "elect," etc.

Yet not to worry: for just as the allotment of Israel's election gained an effect for those (such as servants) to whom it was not directly allotted, likewise, despite unbelieving spouses and children having no title to the allotment, they nonetheless will share in its enjoyment.

A modern example may well serve as a suitable illustration. Those who obtain an election to the Presidency of the United States receive a specific position and allotment of ascendency. They are chosen to a place of authority (e.g. Commander-in-Chief) and to a place of dwelling (The White House). Although it is only those who were *chosen by election* who have any rights to this important role of service, they do not travel to Washington D.C. alone. They bring those of their household with them. Though these spouses and children have no election, choosing, calling or official position, they nevertheless enjoy the grand effect of the allotment of 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue just the same.

Likewise it is with the spouses and children of I Corinthians 7:14. So great is the divine impact of faith!

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The Greatest Actor of All Time

... many portions and many modes ... (Hebrews 1:1)

where God is now directing the greatest drama of all time. All of us are actors in the play that He has meticulously written and is flawlessly producing. All is staged according to His masterscript. Even our "missing the mark" is the grand assurance that He never misses His!

Elohim is the great Story-teller – the greatest of all time. As in human productions, which have great lessons to teach ("the moral to the story is …"), His story is the greatest of them all: teaching masterfully, as only He can do, divine lessons with precise proficiency. In the hands of skilled educators, acting and role-playing are tremendous teaching tools. Of course, God is the greatest Educator of all.

However, it's not the authorship and execution of His show on which I desire to focus at this time. I have written about this in the past. I would now like to highlight His role as Leading Actor: not considering so much His *show*, as His *showmanship*. He's not only the Great Author, the greatest of all time, but *He* is equally the Consummate Actor of His Own production. Some men boldly venture to write, direct and fill the leading role of their own creations. God Himself is the Impeccable Master of such an enterprise.

Some think that the God of the Old Testament and the God of the New Testament are two different "Gods." They do not understand that God has assumed many different roles in order to teach His creation indispensable lessons.

According to Hebrews 1:1-2,

It was **little by little** and in **different ways** that God spoke in **old times** to our forefathers through the prophets, **but** in these latter days He has spoken to us in a Son ... (GNT).

God has taught in the past "bit by bit" (WNT), in "many portions and many modes" (CV). "Many modes" is the adverb πολυτρόπως (polutropōs). It's a compound word meaning "many² deportments or characters.^{3"}

Webster defines the English word "mode" as: "manner of existing or being." Thus God presents Himself on the stage of history (His-story) in many "manners of existing or being," or in many different roles.

Role-playing being such a great teaching method,

For example, God often assumes the role of a man. God isn't a man, but He may sometimes act like one, with human anatomy (eyes, ears, hands, etc.) and human attributes (anger, jealousy, wrath, ignorance, changing his mind,4 etc.) so as to relate to mankind, teach him, and invoke a response from him.

Take the interaction that God had with Adam in Eden's garden as an example. Adam attempted to hide from God. Silly thought, right? Can the creation of an omniscient, omnipresent Creator actually hide from Him? Of course not! However, God played along with Adam, and as if He were a man inquired, "Adam, where are you?"

Similarly, as I would play along with my children when they were little and hiding in plain sight, God condescended to Adam in order to relate to him and reveal a portion of Himself to him. God regularly used this method in "old-times" to teach His creation and invoke a response. However, don't confuse God's masterful acting performances ("many modes") with the reality of just Who He really is.

Back to our modern illustration, and taking Bradley Cooper as an example: he is credited as a writer of the screenplay, the director, and has a leading role in the film A Star is Born. In the movie he plays "Jack"

(Jackson Maine), an aging, troubled singer/musician on a downward spiral. His performance in that role was masterful. However, don't confuse Bradley's skillful acting performances with the reality of just who he really is. That would be a mistake.


Since "Jack" is a fictional character created to tell a story, all one could really know about "him" is the little that Bradley portrayed on screen. Now this begs the question: Who would you rather get to know intimately? Bradley, or his character "Jack"? Well, Bradley of course. He's the one behind it all.

So it is with God. Though He has written the most fascinating story lines, with the most interesting characters, including those of His own leading roles, ultimately it is not the illustrious caricature that He portrays that we truly desire to know, but *Him* – the One behind the "modes." These roles (and metaphors) that He depicts are merely there to lead us slowly, steadily to a place where we are prepared to be genuinely introduced to Him – as He truly is – in an intimate way.

From our text we can see that God transitioned from this "old-time" method of acting ("many modes"), and has in "these latter days" "spoken to us in a Son." Jesus Christ came to "unfold" His Father to us - layer by layer – full of "grace and truth." This revelation of God through His Son did not end at His death, burial and resurrection. From His exalted ministry - ascended and seated "far above all Heavens" – He reveals His Father in His grandest glory to and through Paul. Little wonder at (see **ACTOR**, page 6432)

The Nature of Religious Cliques and Our Attitude Towards Them

... There are contentions among you. ... Every one of you says, "I am of Paul;" and "I of Apollos;" and "I of Cephas;" and "I of Christ." Is Christ divided? ... For ye are yet carnal: for whereas there is among you envying, and strife, and divisions, are ye not carnal, and walk as men? For while one saith, "I am of Paul;" and another, "I am of Apollos;" are you not carnal? Who then is Paul?, and who is Apollos?, but ministers by whom you believed, even as the Lord gave to every man? I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase. So then neither is he that plants anything, neither he that waters; but God who gives the increase. Now he that plants and he that waters are one: and every man shall receive his own reward according to his own labor. For we are laborers together with God ... (I Corinthians 1:11-13; 3:3-9).

Religious cliques are built around an attitude of heart that says, "We've arrived, we know all the truth, we alone are God's people, and we alone carry on His work."

However, God is far bigger than our prideful, narrow creeds, and our meager, limited labors. It's a cult-like teaching that fancies that only those in "our group" who "believe just like we do" are used by God and saved for the ages. It is an extremely ignorant and grievously arrogant position.

... Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up (I Corinthians 8:1).

pact that the religious spirit has had upon his own life.

[After coming] to the knowledge of the truth I went to my then alive 69 year old brother who was a [self-proclaimed] "born again" believer from the age of 17, and to my "born again" 90 year old mother and proclaimed that if they didn't stop believing in [certain errors] they weren't truly saved.



I particularly enjoyed the comments of E.W. Bullinger on page 29,


If this dogma is true, then this is the penalty Christ should have paid when he died for our sins. ... If the debt we owed was "eternal suffering," then that debt has never been paid.

Death is the cessation of life. It is the opposite of life, and not life in some other form or place.

Man is the union of "the dust of the ground" (body) and "the breath of life" (spirit), resulting in a "living soul" (body + spirit = soul). Death is the reversal of this process. The removal of breath from the body results in death (body minus spirit = death). It is likened to "sleep."

... lest I should sleep in death [מָּנֶת (mâveth)] (Psalm 13:3, CLV).
