# The Restoration of the Davidic Scene

ne of the least understood questions relating to the future restoration of the nation of Israel is found in Acts 1:6. The Apostles came to Jesus and asked Him,

Lord, wilt thou at this time restore again the Kingdom to Israel?

There can be no doubt but that the burden upon their hearts was concerned with those myriad prophecies spoken of by the prophets of old: a time when Israel would command a position of recognition among the nations; a time when the ancient promises first communicated by God to Abraham and subsequently to his son Isaac, and to Jacob his son, would be fulfilled. Beyond all doubt, this question envisioned the fulfillment of that glorious and magnificent covenant that God made with David: in short, the restoration of the Davidic scene.

A proper appreciation of these great promises God made with Abraham is not possible without carefully reading and believing Genesis 12:2-3; 13:14-17; 17:6-8. The enormity of these blessings and the scope of these unilateral covenants defy description.

Consider statements such as these:

... and I will make of thee a great nation ... I will bless thee, and make thy name great ... in thee shall all the families of the Earth be blessed ... all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed eonian ... I will make thy seed as the dust of the Earth: so that

if a man can number the dust of the Earth, then shall thy seed be numbered ... I will establish My covenant between Me and thee and thy seed after thee in their generations for an eonian covenant ... (Genesis 12:2-3; 13:15-16; 17:7).

The mere contemplation of these blessings is mindboggling. Think of the enormous wealth, the riches, the honor and glory which God has determined upon that nation of Israel. There is no nation today, nor has any nation existed in the annals of history, that has been the recipient of such a vast array of physical, material or spiritual blessings.

The inescapable conclusion is that at this point in time these promises simply have not been fulfilled. Many well-meaning Christians have been led to believe that these blessings have not and never will materialize because of Israel's unbelief. Conclusions such as these fail to recognize that no sin in Israel's national life could possibly make null and void these awesome covenants.

Hebrews 6:13-20 speaks of the "... *immutability* of His counsel." God, determined to show the unchangeableness of His resolve, *i.e.*, the divine purpose, interposed an oath between the promise

and the fulfillment showing that it was impossible for God to lie. Thus by "... two immutable things," i.e., His promise and His oath, God provided for the consolation of these first century A.D. believers. This passage points to the anchor of soul, namely our Lord Jesus Christ, upon whom these promises remain unshakeable, inviolable and secure.

Consider the facts pertaining to Israel's future glory as set forth in the Davidic covenant. I Chronicles 17:7-14 reveals the substance of this covenant. Note these definitive statements:

... also I will ordain a place for my people Israel, and will plant them, and they shall dwell in their place, and shall be moved no more ... Moreover I will subdue all thine enemies. ... I will raise up thy seed after thee, which shall be of thy sons; and I will establish his kingdom. He shall build me an house, and I will establish his throne eonian.

These words spoken by God to David were His promise that He would exercise His sovereign power to establish the Davidic throne (Note also II Samuel 7:10-13). David will yet one day be resurrected from the dead and assume the position of King over Israel. The authority and power that David will exercise will be the direct result of Jesus Christ in Heaven exercising His right to govern (note Ezekiel 34:22-31).

The absolute guarantee of that divine purpose can be clearly seen in such passages as Psalm 89:34-36.

My covenant will I not break, nor alter the thing that is gone out of My lips. Once have I sworn by My holiness that I will not lie unto David. His seed shall endure eonian, and his throne as the sun before Me.

Consider Jeremiah 33:20-22, 25-26. In those oftignored but most important prophecies the Lord provides the most positive truth to be found anywhere in Scripture confirming His intention to multiply the seed of David.

These words were spoken some fifteen hundred years after the death of Abraham, some four hundred sixty years after David's death. Yet they are as irrevocable

as when God first spoke them. The Davidic covenant speaks of a time when God will appoint a place for His people Israel and plant them in the Earth (See I Chronicles 17:9).

Many believe that the recognition given by the United Nations in 1946 of Israel giving her sovereignty marks the fulfillment of these blessings. Nothing could be further from the truth. There is absolutely no correlation whatever between that little land of Palestine occupied by the Israelis today and the borders of that land as revealed in Ezekiel 47.

Israel's borders as specified in Ezekiel describe the land of promise extending from the River Nile on the west to the River Euphrates on the east. It encompasses the land from the Mediterranean Sea on the north to the Persian Gulf on the south. Any modern map would show that this great land of promise includes present day Syria, Jordan, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and a significant portion of Egypt.

Title to this land belongs to Abraham and his descendants. It is this land and not this tiny country of Palestine that is the subject of the great prophecies of Jeremiah and Ezekiel (Read Ezekiel 11:17-20; 20:33-42; 34:11-16, 23-28; 37:21-22; 39:27-28; Jeremiah 32:37-41; 33:12-14.)

Language would be absolutely futile if God did not mean what He has said. God says repeatedly "I will" in affirmation of His Holy Word. As a man of faith, I believe that God will fulfill His Word to the very letter. It cannot be denied that, since the days of Solomon when the nation became divided into the ten northern tribes and the two tribes in Judah, the


nation as a whole has been scattered, not lost. Any suggestion of the ten lost tribes of Israel is foreign to the Word of God.

Israel's sin in departing from God and her involvement with idolatry caused God to punish her severely. God's indictment of that nation is clearly set forth in Isaiah 1:1-4. Within the space of one hundred years from the time that those words were spoken, Jerusalem was sacked, the palaces were gutted by fire and the goodly vessels destroyed (note II Chronicles 36:15-21; II Kings 21:12-13). These passages make abundantly clear the extent of destruction which God permitted Nebuchadnezzar to heap on Jerusalem and her people.

For seventy years Judah would be in servitude to the king of Babylon (note Jeremiah 25:11-12). Following this captivity, Israel was once again allowed to return to her land; the fact remains, though, that Palestine would not be the physical home of the majority of Jews. Streams of Jews would migrate into Egypt and other countries outside of the land of Palestine. By the time of the birth of Christ the number of Jews living abroad would far exceed the number remaining at home.

In spite of those deportations into Babylon and her exile from the land of promise, Israel has a great future. God in His sovereign wisdom will yet act openly and manifestly to regather that nation. Hearts hardened through unbelief will yet turn to God. In the momentous words of Jeremiah the prophet God declares.

"Behold the days come," saith the Lord, "that

I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel, and with the House of Judah ... After those days," saith the Lord, "I will put My law in their inward parts, and write it in their hearts; and will be their God, and they shall be My people" (31:31-33).

The fulfillment of this promise will result in a great reawakening of the heart and mind of every Israelite. Those long dead will respond to the divine call when God speaks and declares,

Behold, O my people, I will open your graves ... and bring you into the land of Israel .... and shall put My Spirit in you, and ye shall live, and I shall place you in your own land (Ezekiel 37:12-14).

Israel, long scattered, will be regathered (note Ezekiel 20:33-42).

... I will bring you out from the people and will gather you out of the countries wherein ye are scattered ...

This passage describes, in the clearest language possible, God's intention to denationalize the nation of Israel and return her

into the land of Israel, into the country for the which I lifted up Mine hand to give it to your fathers.

It is nothing less than this majestic scene that filled the mind of the Apostle James as he spoke in Acts 15:13-17. Note:16.

... After this I will return, and build again the Tabernacle of David [the Davidic scene] which is fallen down; and I will build again the ruins thereof, and I will set it up.

These words were spoken almost two thousand years ago. To this day they remain unfulfilled. This long delay was neither understood nor contemplated as the prophets spoke; for while their eyes were allowed to see "... the sufferings of Christ, and the glory that should follow" (I Peter 1:11), they could not comprehend the secret hidden in God, that long display of grace which has characterized God's dealings with mankind for the past two thousand years of human history.


Next is the divine manifestation of sovereignty, God speaking from Heaven and causing the great river of prophecy to flow once again. When that happens, every promise of God and every prophetic utterance relating to the future of Israel and the restoration of the Davidic scene will come to pass. At long last, God will fulfill to the very letter every promise and every word He spoke to the nation of Israel. In the words of the prophet Amos,

... "I will plant them upon their land, and they shall no more be pulled up out of their land which I have given them," saith the Lord thy God (Amos 9:11-15). BSN

# A Personal Word about Doctrine and Fellowship

Though some seem to believe that it should be otherwise, I doubt any two honest, active, thorough, independent students of Scripture have ever seen everything eye-to-eye. It's important for me that you understand that I am perfectly fine with God positioning us all at different places in our journeys, as well as that I do *not* see differences as hindrances to fellowship. What we have in Christ is unity – *not* uniformity. We're not wall-builders but bridge-builders.

I determined long ago, through the guidance of a dear aged teacher of God's truths, that if there were going to be walls of separation between me and others, it would be others who would have to build them. There has ever been only one divinely-built wall dividing humanity, and God Himself tore it down (Ephesians 2:14). Ours is a ministry of conciliation (II Corinthians 5:18-20). We, like God Himself, are conciliatory to all.

In fact, not only do I *not* see our doctrinal differences as any hindrance to fellowship, it is quite the opposite: I am thankful to God for them, and I see them as quite a gift, because they provide the greater context of the Spirit's operation of love and grace. "... We know that

we all have knowledge. Knowledge puffs up, but love edifies" (I Corinthians 8:1).

All too often the fruit of God's Spirit is associated with doctrinal agreement, but even the world – without God's Spirit – manages to get along with only those with whom they agree *most*. To be "*likeminded*" is not to be in doctrinal agreement but rather to have the "same mind," and that's the "the mind of Christ." As Paul says, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." Then the apostle to the Nations speaks of Christ's humility. Our *likemindedness* is the spiritual-mind of Christ's humility, service and self-sacrifice (Philippians 2:5-8).

Thankfully, we've been called to "receive one another, as Christ also received us to the glory of God" (Romans 15:7), while at the same time each of us has been granted the freedom to "be fully persuaded in his own mind" (Romans 14:5). Though we may not be able to have a "meeting of the minds," we can certainly realize that we have been given the "the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace," for which we have been called to endeavor to keep (Ephesians 4:3).

## I emperance and Alcohol

emperance is, unfortunately, one of those words that has changed its meaning. It now usually means teetotalism. But in the days when the second Cardinal virtue was christened "Temperance," it meant nothing of the sort.

Temperance referred not specially to drink, but to all pleasures; and it meant not abstaining but going the right length and no further.

It is a mistake to think that Christians ought all to be teetotalers; Mohammedanism, not Christianity, is the teetotal religion. Of course it may be the duty of a particular Christian, or of any Christian, at a particular time, to abstain from strong drink, either because he is the sort of man who cannot drink at all without drinking too much, or because he is with people who are inclined to drunkenness and must not encourage them by drinking himself.

But the whole point is that he is abstaining, for a good reason, from something which he does not condemn and which he likes to see other people enjoying.

One of the marks of a certain type of bad man is that he cannot give up a thing himself without wanting everyone else to give it up.

That is not the Christian way.

An individual Christian may see fit to give up all sorts of things for special reasons marriage, or meat, or beer, or the cinema; but the moment he starts saying the things are bad in themselves, or looking down his nose at other people who do use them, he has taken the wrong turning.


One great piece of mischief has been done by the modern restriction of the word "temperance" to the question of drink. It helps people to forget that you can be just as intemperate about lots of other things. A man who makes his golf or his motorcycle the center of his life, or a woman who devotes all her thoughts to clothes or bridge or her dog, is being just as "intemperate" as someone who gets drunk every evening.

Of course, it does not show on the outside so easily: bridge-mania or golf-mania do not make you fall down in the middle of the road. But God is not deceived by externals.

What is love? The Greek word is *agapē*.
